

### LLANDUDNO REGATTA

Favoured by fine weather, and patronised by a large concourse of spectators, the annual regatta at Llandudno took place on Saturday August 5<sup>th</sup>, with a fairly successful result. Hitherto the programme has been almost exclusively limited to a start and finish of yachts belonging to the Royal Dee Yacht Club......'

A poster advertising the Boatmen's Regatta of 1888


### **1899** Commodore – James J Marks



One of the earliest pictures of Llandudno Sailing Club taken in July 1899.



### **1900** Commodore – James J Marks





There were several races scheduled for the 1900 season, but things never change!

24<sup>th</sup> May – race for the Bradley Cup – two boats entered; 'Bobs' won, 'Myfanwy' gave up after round 1.

26<sup>th</sup> May – Cruise unsuccessful due to lack of wind – 'Bobs', 'Gwen', 'Gwalch' and 'Myfany' left their moorings.

2<sup>nd</sup> June – Race postponed owing to 'boistrous weather'.

The season continued in similar fashion.



The caption says this aerial photo of the old Arcadia was taken in 1953.

The Pitch and Put Course is clearly visible with the Golf hut in plain view. This is now our board hut and is still in use today.

The Grand Theatre (now the Broadway Boulevard) is to the left with what appears to be the LSP Garage behind it. On the far side of the Arcadia there is what looks like a skating rink. The field beyond the bus is where the venue Cymru Theatre now stands.

Llandudno Sailing Club Clubhouse is on the land between the Golf hut and the promenade. The club followed the original building line of the Arcadia. When the Venue Cymru Exhibition Hall was constructed the building line was moved forward. This gave the club the opportunity to construct its extension with the balcony, bosuns store, classroom and office.

### **1961-62** Commodore – Bill Sargent



Bill Sargent was the first Commodore of the newly re-formed Llandudno Sailing Club Over the three days of the Whitsun holiday in 1962 the club hosted the very first Merlin-Rockets 'Cock O' The North Trophy'. This was also the first major sailing event organised by the club.

Speaking with Norman Brierley in January 2005 about the UKOBA (United Kingdom Offshore Boating Association) event.

This was the very first event organised by the re-formed Llandudno Sailing Club

Norman Brierley was a member of the UKOBA and used to race powerboats at UKOBA events. Norman persuaded the association to move its North Wales race from Pwllheli to Llandudno. Approximately 50 boats took part in the race which started in flat calm conditions. Within a very short space of time the wind increased to gale force, causing mayhem amongst the competitors. One boat sank off the Little Orme. The race was abandoned and as the boats started to return to shore, the wind moderated and the sea returned to an almost flat calm. Pochin provided his boat 'Angelsey 2' as the Committee Boat and Regent petrol acted as sponsor with a tanker on the promenade to re-fuel the racing boats.


The United Kingdom Offshore Boating Association presented the Club with the UKOBA Trophy which is still raced for today, but in sailing dinghies not powerboats.

#### President – Lord Mostyn



Lord Mostyn was very supportive of the Club providing the site of the clubhouse at a peppercorn rent.

He sailed regularly on Wednesday evenings with Roy Wakeham in Roy's Lark.

## **1962-69** Commodore – George Hiller



George Hiller was Commodore for seven years. As Lord Mostyn's estate agent he negotiated the lease of the land on which the Clubhouse was built.


The Committee persuaded George to stay as Commodore whilst the Club applied for a Sports Council grant to build the present Clubhouse.

The Merlin-Rocket class came for their 'Cock-o'-the-North' event over the weekend of 1<sup>st</sup> to 3<sup>rd</sup> of June. , followed in August by the GP14 National Championship.



This was the first major championship in the newly reformed Llandudno Sailing Club.

The class would return every four years until 1979



Obviously not a happy day!!

The Club used a caravan as the Race Office for all major events from 1963 until the old wooden slipway opposite the Imperial Hotel was destroyed in a storm in 2013.

The caravan was parked on the Promenade opposite the Marine Hotel. There was an electrical socket in the nearby street lamp which the club could use to power the radio.

Processing of the results for National Championships took place in the basement of the Marine Hotel, a long and tiresome process without computers.

Two club members slept overnight in the caravan to periodically patrol the dinghies to make sure no-one interfered with them.

# **1964**

### *1969*

1969 was Investiture Year.

The Club hosted the International 14 class who sailed the 'Prince of Wales Cup' race with the Royal Yacht Britannia at anchor in Llandudno Bay.

The Prince of Wales then continued his tour of Wales from Llandudno.



This is the only time the International 14 class have raced in Llandudno.

Later, in August, the Graduate Class Association held its National Championship in Llandudno for the first time.


#### Commodore – John Graham-Smith



John raced a Fireball with his son Ian.

John provided the trophy for the Constable Buoy race, which was a replica of the original Constable Buoy. It looked like the sting of a bumble-bee!!

On John's death, Ian provided a silver Cup for the Constable Buoy race, the original trophy being awarded to second place. Both require rounding the Constable to be awarded.


# *1972-73*





## 1974-75

#### Commodore – Ian Forfar



Ian did not have a lot of luck when it came to Championships.

In 1974 the Fireballs paid their only visit to Llandudno. The week they chose, against the advice of the Club, had the largest tides for 300 years. This combined with a total lack of good wind and a fleet of 175 competing boats resulted in a very poor championship! lan was an Auxiliary Coastguard

To Paul Williams. Pauls father was Sailing Captain at the time. The Club was approved as a Training Centre under the leadership of Alan Wright, a senior instructor.

Training took place every Friday evening.

#### **GP14** Nationals

1975 was a unique year when the club hosted the GP14 National Championships and had a record entry for a dinghy Nationals of 227 boats!! They stretched on the Promenade dinghy park from the old Imperial slipway to past the Clubhouse and the Washington Hotel.

Fifteen brand new boats were all kicked out of the Championship because they did not measure. They became known as the 'coffin' boats, having been built by an undertaker!

The duty roster for this event is on the next page. Look at the number of guard boats required.

Earlier in the season the Club Regatta attracted 75 entries and the very last race of the season had 40 club boats racing.

Neither number has been exceeded since.

### *1977-79*

#### Commodore – Tony Lockett




Tony built and raced a Fireball in the Club.

He later served three terms on RYA Council, became Chairman of the RYA Race Management Committee, served for five years on the Racing Rules Committee and eventually represented the RYA on the ISAF Race Management Committee becoming Chairman in 2002. He officiated at the Sydney Olympic Games in 2000 and became Chief Race Officer at the 2004 Athens Olympic Games. Tony was Auxiliary i/c Llandudno Coastguard for twelve years

## **1979-81**

#### Commodore – Peter Morris-Gibbons



Peter acted as Assistant Race Officer for various National Championships in the Club

Peter was Commodore when the Club experimented with two classes having their Nationals in Llandudno during the same week. This came about because the policy at that time was that a class had to guarantee a 100+ entry before we would accept them for a one-week Championship.

The two classes were the Graduates and the Miracles, the latter class having their very first one-week event. Both fleets were around 65 in number, thus meeting the 100+ boats required by the club.

To ensure that there was harmony among the two fleets the Graduates were given all the odd numbered berths and the Miracles took the even number berths!

Both fleets had 'gate starts' with the second fleet starting to run their gate when the leaders of the first fleet were two thirds the way up the first beat.

Two recording teams were required on the Committee Boat so that the Graduates finished on the starboard side and the Miracles on the port side.


Two separate venues were used for the Prize Presentation. The Miracles were in the 'Grand Hotel' with the Mayor of Llandudno in attendance and the Rear-Commodore while the Graduates were in the 'St George's Hotel' with the Mayor of Aberconwy and the Vice-Commodore joining them.

Lord Mostyn, as President of the Club presented all the prizes being shuttled between the two venues by the Commodore.

# *1981*

#### Sailboards

With the start of construction of the Conwy tunnel quite a few of the engineers working on the project joined the club.

A number of them joined the various fleets in the club but a lot of the new members took up Windsurfing.

Initially they raced in the Fast Handicap Fleet but as their numbers grew they were given class status and had their own start and course separate from the dinghies.

The driving force behind the Sailboarders were Rob Arnold and his partner Kathy Woodhead. Rob eventually became Sailing Captain.

Gradually as people moved away from the area on completion of the tunnel the sailboard fleet was once more absorbed into the Handicap fleets of the club.

However, a number of members continued to race and very slowly they switched to more conventional methods, many purchasing Lasers.

Among this group were Steve Lawrence, Rob Davies, Phil Northam and Ken Davies.

The Sailboard era lasted about ten years.

### Commodore - John Nicol




John raced a Fireball with his son Jeremy crewing.

For years there was an oblong mounted piece of plywood that was on display in the clubhouse, labelled 'danger board infested waters'. It was part of the 'letterbox' punched into John's Fireball by one of the fleet of Sailboards racing at that time.

In 1984 the club hosted the Scorpion Nationals followed by the Miracle nationals in 1985 John was an Auxiliary Coastguard

### Commodore – Phil Wilkes



Phil, an electrician by trade, was responsible for all the wiring when the clubhouse was built in 1967.

He was another Fireball sailor but crewed more than helmed his boat 'True Blue'.

There was no championship in 1986 but the GP14 class returned in 1987. Another successful event.

#### Commodore – Peter Gradwell



There was no Championship in Peters first year in office but the Albacore nationals were held in 1989.

What is now the workshop under the clubhouse was originally open. One night some youths entered, stood a small RIB on its transom and set fire to it under the club. Luckily it was caught in time but there was some fire damage in the Clubhouse, where the current TV is situated.

1989 - 91

#### Commodore – Maurice Wigzell – National Race Officer



In 1990 the National Twelve class returned for their Nationals always known as

'Burton Cup Week'.

They were followed in 1991 by the Toppers Maurice raced a Fireball Maurice qualified as one of the first 'National Race Officers' under the newly created RYA Race Officer Training scheme.

He was Principal Race Officer for events in Holyhead and Pwllheli as well as at home in Llandudno.

In 1998 he travelled to Dubai as part of the North Wales Race Management team operating on the J22 course at the ISAF World Championships of Sailing.

He later acted as Assistant Race Officer at the Dubai Junior International Regatta for several years. This was always held in late January.

### Llandudno Sailing Club Golf Society

This was formed in the early 1990's and comprised of a few members who played at different local clubs.

A trophy was provided and visits to clubs in the immediate area as well as further a field in Holyhead and Shrewsbury.

The main contestants were Phil Northam, Steve Lawrence, Keith Murday, Ray Hooper, Paul Moreton and Tony Lockett

Unfortunately, there is no photographic record of the Society which only survived for two or three years.

#### Commodore - Stan Ellis



Stan was a keen GP14 sailor winning a number of club trophies.

As Commodore Stan welcomed the Miracle class in 1992 followed by the GP14 class in 1993.

Both classes had very successful championships.

#### Commodore – Janet Lockett

Janet was the first Lady Commodore She became an excellent hand at the front of the Fireball crewing for husband, Tony and later sailing with Keith Tout

The Albacores returned for their Nationals in 1994

In September 1995 an 80 year old driver of an automatic hit the wrong pedal and drove his car through the fence from the Boulevard roundabout and smashed five dinghies before stopping against a Landrover parked near the Boardhut!

#### Commodore - Phil Northam - National Race Officer




Phil Northam became the third club member to become a National Race Officer.

In 1996 the Mirror class returned for their Nationals followed in 1997 by the Topper class. Phil acted as Chief Race Officer for both events.

In the 1990's a catamaran fleet was established with a number of boats moving into the club for regular racing.

#### Commodore – Paul Moreton – National Race Officer



Paul was the first Junior member of the club to become Commodore. He served in office for three years.

In 1998 the 420 class came to Llandudno for the first time for their nationals followed in 2000 by the National Twelves for Burton Cup Week.

Paul became the fourth club member to qualify as a National Race Officer.



In 1999 the club hosted the Catamaran Nationals.

Two course areas were set in the Bay with the Nacras inshore under Phil Northam's Race Committee and out to sea the larger Formula 1 Cats with Tony Lockett as Race Officer

President – John Rowlands



John became the second President of the Club in 2000 following the death of Lord Mostyn in the previous year.

2001 - 02

#### Commodore – Pat Botham



Pat was a catamaran sailor

During the second year of his term the Club hosted a double championship with the Miracles and 405's joining together for the event. Phil Northam was Race Officer



In 2002 Tony resigned as Chairman of the RYA Race Management Committee to take up the position of Chief Race Officer for the 2004 Athens Olympic regatta.

Tony had previously acted as an Assistant Race Officer at the 2000 Olympic Regatta in Sydney, Australia.

Prior to these two appointments, Tony had led the development of both the RYA and the ISAF Race Officer Training programmes. He was the lead trainer in both these programmes and with the latter travelled all over the world running IRO Seminars in a variety of countries.

### Commodore – Tony Lockett – International Race Officer

Hugh served as Commodore for four years. Hugh was an Auxiliary Coastguard

Hugh commenced a policy of looking for a steady income for the Club. Initial enquiries with HM Coastguard to share the site proved not to be viable. Later ideas included building apartments on site and sharing with the RNLI. None of these ideas came to fruition.

Mostyn Estates came up with three other proposals. One was to take over the Shelbourne Hotel. Another was to be part of the Pier Pavilion redevelopment and finally a move to a site on Bodafon farm as part of a leisure development with launching off the beach where the Llandudno Lifeboat Station is now located.

In October 2008 the snug and bar areas were refurbished with new furniture and carpets. The main lounge area was also re-carpeted and new tables and chairs were installed.







Two months later disaster struck!

At lunchtime on New Years Eve 2008, Paul Moreton arrived at the club to put the heating on and prepare for the New Year's Eve Party.

He was greeted with a waterfall coming down the stairs and about two inches of water covering the whole of the top floor, (snug, bar, kitchen and main room).

During the very cold period a joint had been forced in the header tank located in the loft over the kitchen. The weight of water had brought down the ceiling in both the kitchen and the bar, just missing Paul.

Needless to say, the party did not take place in the clubhouse but Andy McNamara came to the rescue and the party took place in his Hotel.



Update published in the Club News & Views February 2009 Mike Knowles who is guiding the work in the clubhouse reports the following on Monday 26<sup>th</sup> January

Drying out of Clubhouse just about complete and Dehumidifiers returned to contractor; Scottish Power have installed a new isolator switch so that club testing and rewiring can take place; Electrical Work - Contractor appointed; Plasterboard work - Contractor appointed; Plumbing repairs - Contractor appointed; Floor coverings - Estimate received & yet to be agreed; Upstairs decoration

- Estimate pending; Burglar & Fire Alarms - Stores & costs identified (To be fitted by club members); New Kitchen - Design agreed & costs obtained; Kitchen Appliances - All ordered (Dishwasher on site); Insurance matters - Ongoing negotiation with agent.

With temperatures below freezing the main room became an ice-rink for a week before the de-humidifiers could be effective.



A grant of £2500 from Conwy CBC paid for the re-wiring and Llandudno Town Council gave £500 towards the cost of new curtains.

During the closed season Paul Moreton completed two training sessions in the Club's Guard Boats

Successful candidates earned their RYA PB2 Certificate on a cold February weekend.

Grants were obtained from Conwy County, Llandudno Town Council, Sport Wales with very strong support in kind by Mostyn Estates.

Club members supported the finances through a loan scheme all the money being repaid within two years.

#### Training

Meanwhile, sailing and training continued as normal.

The Club has had a long association with the schools in Llandudno. John Bright Grammar School's Sailing Club was an associate member and they kept their boats on the club dinghy park.

Later St David's College also became associate members, many of the pupils joining the club as individual members and winning a number of trophies.

In the 1970's, the Warwickshire Outdoor Pursuits centre at Marle Hall also used the Club as a base for their sailing activities.

In 2010 three Llandudno Primary Schools had a one day 'Taster session' using the clubs training fleet.

Blessed William Davies, Craig-y-Don and Tudno were the schools involved. In addition to the sailing they were also taken out in the Guard boats with, on one occasion viewing a pod of Dolphins off the end of Llandudno Pier.

This happened when the tractor, driven by Gareth Roberts, locked wheels on the slippery slipway and slid over the edge to finish on its side on the beach.



It was recovered and returned to service after examination.



Two weeks later the slipway was very badly damaged in a north-westerly storm.



Negotiations with the County Council about building a new slipway were already underway when the damage was done.

It was decided to locate this opposite the club and abandon the old slipway which was some 300 metres away on the promenade opposite the Imperial Hotel.
